ne advantage of writing this at the last minute is the opportunity to report on our Annual Vestry Meeting on Sunday, February 26th. The meeting, attended both in person and by Zoom, presented some technical challenges, and was nevertheless ably chaired by our Rector Elizabeth with Pam Brown as the Recording Secretary.

Elizabeth read the names of those parishioners who died in 2022. They were: Joan Bodie; Kenneth Brambell; Joan Brambell; Ronald George Brewer; Yvonne Mary Poole; Denys Peter Monk; Marjorie Stephenson; Alphonsine Clowes; Gladys Naomi Henderson.

After dealing with the formalities of the meeting, Sandy Morter updated us on the preparations for St. Mark's Fair on July 22nd. The Farmers Market has graciously agreed to move to a location across from Quality Foods for the day, which will help to make the Fair a success. The Gardens has agreed to participate in the Fair, and Sandy has also invited the Legion and the Qualicum Beach Curling Club to participate. The Knights of Columbus have agreed to help us with traffic control again. Sandy reported that about half of the booths have already been reserved. Amazing this far ahead of the Fair!

The next item on the agenda was a motion by Carolyn Adam that \$6,000 of the 2023 Fair revenue be given to the Young Life Ministry. Carolyn gave an overview of Young Life's programs in Qualicum over the past 15 years. It was estimated that the Fair would generate approximately \$8,000 in revenue including the booth rentals and revenue from the sale of books and pies. After a good discussion from the congregation the motion was approved unanimously.

The next agenda item was the Nomination Report by Terry Roberts. All members of the present Parish Council have agreed to stand for another year and I have also agreed to stand for Parish Council for one year. There being no nominations from the floor, the Parish Council is as follows: Wendy de Candole; Barbara Hicks; David Hitchcock; Diane Hutchison; Marion Jagger; David Kelsey; Cynthia Preyser; John Smith; Terry Roberts.

Richard de Candole will continue as the People's Warden and Sue Smith was appointed by Elizabeth to be the new Rector's Warden.

Delegates for the Synod in May are Wendy de Candole and Diane Hutchison. Cynthia Preyser and Terry Roberts will serve as Alternate Synod Delegates.

Anne Field, our Financial Statements reviewer, reported "that the figures shown in the church's year-end financial statements for December 31, 2022 accurately represent the financial status of the Parish of St. Mark." Anne has agreed to review our books for 2023. The last item on the agenda was a presentation from our Treasurer, Wendy Carriere of our 2022 year end results and the proposed budget for 2023. The financial statements for 2022 showed we had a deficit of \$18, 078.

The 2023 budget, already approved by Parish Council, was submitted to the meeting for discussion and adoption. The budget included the transfers of \$11,500 from the Residential School Settlement Fund, the Spiritual Development Fund and the Sabbatical Fund. Even with these transfers, our anticipated deficit is \$34,959, of which a substantial portion is the increased cost of music ministry. Elizabeth reminded us of our Journey in 2022, when we held cottage meetings with over 75% of our congregation, and took careful records about what was said, so as to determine what we think God is calling us to do. You said we want to reconnect with each other in the congregation and to reconnect with the Oceanside community. We have made great progress in the areas of pastoral care, fellowship and outreach but we have not made substantial progress in our music ministry. We have relied heavily on David Hitchcock's wonderful talents and he is ready to retire and just sing in the choir. The Music Committee interviewed two strong candidates and recommended that we hire a two person team, which you can read about elsewhere. In her presentation Wendy Carriere reminded us that if we had all given an extra \$2.54 per week in 2022 we would not have a deficit this year. John Smith introduced the idea of a Ten Percent Team, where, if everyone increases their annual donations by 10%, we can go a long way to eliminating the deficit. After discussion the congregation voted unanimously to adopt the 2023 budget. May 2023 be our transforming music year!

This is the last year of my term as the Rector's Warden. It has been an honour and a pleasure to have been given the opportunity to support Elizabeth over the past two years. As the Bishop said when she last visited St. Mark, Elizabeth is one of the best and we are lucky to have her.

And thanks to all of you for persevering through the dark times of COVID. It is great to see the church filling up again, and to see us welcoming many new faces as well. I look forward to many more opportunities that God will provide for us to serve each other, our community and the world in the years ahead.

Notes from Annual Vestry Meeting:

A snowy day has come to St Mark! A snowy Vestry day and yet we gather in order to praise God and give thanks for all the gifts of God's love for us.

In this past year, we've been busy planning and returning to a somewhat renewed life – "post Covid" – and yet the virus is still around us, and today we think of some of our friends gathered at home because of illness – and pray for their speedy recovery.

A Vestry day though, is a day for remembering the past year's ministry, and then to reflect on the path forward to continue to answer God's calling.

Last spring there were a number of Cottage Meetings when we asked the people of St Mark, "What do you think God is calling us to do?" At the end of the day, the Transforming our Future Team (Cynthia Preyser, John Smith, Wendy de Candole, Terry Roberts) reviewed every comment and teased out a common thread.

That thread was two-fold – to renew and reconnect – within the Parish and secondly within the community! And that's what we've been up to – Renewing and reconnecting, both within the parish and within the community. Ministry Activities such as fund-raising for the people of Ukraine, and for those affected by the recent earthquake have had an amazing response from the St Mark community and the wider community of Oceanside. We're even in the PWRDF news!

The Transforming team also saw that the importance of music was a key theme and was found "spoken" at each meeting.

From this idea, the Parish Council commissioned a music committee to examine and look for a music director who would meet our needs to enhance and add vitality to our worship. The committee has been diligent and found a suitable candidate to fill this role amongst us. After



meeting and holding a mock choir event for each of our two candidates, the music committee recommended to Parish Council that an offer be made to Ron Klusmeier and Lonnie Moddle to fill the position of Music Director. Although they are "two" musicians, they will share the ministry and cost of one position.

The next challenge before us is the second

step of the Cottage meeting process – now we must count the cost of carrying out the ministry that we believe God is calling us to accomplish.

A vibrant music ministry to continue to brighten our worship, the opportunity to engage in music within the community through choir and concert work – will come at a cost. That cost will come from us, if we are willing and engaged in answering God's call.

Today in our Vestry meeting we will be asked to support a vision budget that sees us engage in the community –

- Through our efforts in the 50th Anniversary of St. Mark's Fair.
- To enhance the ministry we share with the Elders of our church community
- Through our support of Youth Ministry, Messy Church and the Young Life program
- Through an enhanced music program that will see us hire a music director and choir director.
- Through celebrating our Diocesan partnership with others who gather for Synod and the Order of the Diocese of BC. I am pleased to let you know that although there are many worthy recipients, Ryan Geboers has been nominated to be our Parish candidate for this year.

These are challenging times, but like Jesus in the desert, we have decisions to make in order that we answer God's call. Let's be affirming in our ministry, and follow as Christ would have us go.

PARISHIONER PROFILE: RYAN & ANN GEBOERS

eventy years ago this month, Holland experienced the flood of the century, and Ryan's family lost everything. Relations in the Ottawa Valley sponsored them to emigrate to Canada – Mum, Dad, Ryan, his two sisters and three brothers. They sailed to Halifax, landing at the famous Pier 21 as did so many immigrants, then went by train to Petawawa, Ryan celebrating his 10th birthday on the train. "Don't bring anything" they were told. So things were pretty sparse for the parents and six kids crammed into a two bedroom house. School wasn't much fun either, especially as Ryan didn't speak English – it was a two mile walk to a Catholic school run by some rather unkind nuns.

After the family moved to Bowmanville, Ryan, aged 16, worked briefly for a bricklayer, and then in 1961 applied to GM at their huge plant in Oshawa. He got in at the lowest level – the boy's group at the lowest pay and the hardest work. When it was found that Ryan had an aptitude for mapping, a colleague taught him about graphs, charts and autoCAD. Before long he moved up the ladder, first working for a supervisor, then the supervisor's superintendent, then that man's boss, and so on. The Plant consisted of a number of units, covering 648 acres -"Everybody did their own thing – there was no overall picture". Ryan developed a comprehensive autoCAD Plan, complete with internal routes. Over the years, Ryan was put in charge of more things, like office supplies, then pool cars, and then conducting tours of the Plant. Once, Ryan and Ann used one of the pool

cars – a prototype Chevrolet Lumina - to go on a trip, and got stopped by the police in Detroit because they wanted to look at the car!

After 38.5 years with GM, 20 of them in the Engineering office, Ryan retired – in all those years he only took one day off for a doctor's appointment! He was given two clocks, one at 25 years, and a second one upon retirement, with '38.5 years' inscribed on it. He also has a leather jacket everyone got when the Plant was named Number One in North America.

Ann was born in Leicestershire. She didn't meet her father until he arrived home from the War when she was eight; she was with a group of girls, and he didn't know which was his daughter! "I asked if I was adopted!" For the duration of the War, Ann's mother had a boarder for company, Velma, from Saskatchewan. Velma became Ann's lifelong friend and spiritual mother - she encouraged Ann to "give some of your life to the Lord". It was through Velma that Ann became involved with the Canadian Sunday School Caravan Mission. She learned about being a 'vanner' – a volunteer Mission van driver, learning vehicle maintenance and how to do minor repairs, as well as how to drive! After a brief time at a Teacher's Training College, Ann sailed to Canada to work as a vanner for the Mission. Never having driven "on the wrong side of the road", Ann drove a Ford truck from Windsor to Peace River Alberta, with a block to reach the pedals. She took on the job of a vanner up the Mackenzie Highway (then a dirt road), bringing Church services, Bible Vacation School and Sunday School to the families and children in settlements and First Nations communities scattered along the Highway. Vanners were meant to work in couples, and were not to go to or stay in people's homes, "but I broke all the rules as I was alone so much of the time."

After two summers, and one winter in Stewart, including interaction with a Prince Rupert evangelical group, Ann sailed back to England from New York with the Vanner Mission founders, Eva Hasell and Iris Sayle. Once home, Ann briefly worked for a vet; then she returned to Canada, where she found a position with a vet in Oshawa.

One New Year's Eve, this worried young man came in to the clinic with his German Shepherd, 'King', who had sustained a bad cut. Ann found that her boss, the vet, was well into the New Year spirits, so she did the necessary stitching herself. Well, the young man was Ryan, and within a year Ryan and Ann were engaged. They were married in November, 1964 – not December, as Ryan knew he could claim Ann as a tax deduction that year as long as they were married before December!

Not that getting married was all that easy. Ryan comes from a strongly committed Roman Catholic family – he was an altar boy in his youth – and Ann's family was equally strongly Anglican. Ryan and Ann were going to services at the Anglican Church, where there was a wonderful minister. It turned out that Ryan's mother was the house cleaner for this minister, so things got sorted out, and with everyone's approval they were married at St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church.

For their first 40 years of married life, Ryan and Ann lived in Courtice, a rural area of Bowmanville, now obliterated by the 401/425 interchange. Their neighbours had acreage and a large house, where Ann kept her horse. When the neighbours went to Mexico for ten years to establish and run an orphanage, they rented their property to Ryan and Ann for a dollar a year, and another neighbour bought their house for cash. How sweet a deal was that! And they had a place for Pippa the horse, Dusty Rose the donkey, and later, another donkey, Dolly. Nine years later, the neighbours returned from Mexico, and Ryan and Ann, who had always wanted to live in the West, took the donkeys to an animal sanctuary in Guelph and moved to Peachland. They enjoyed lots of things about Peachland, including golf, tennis and Bishop Crawley, but Qualicum Beach was in their dreams.

Early in 2000, Ryan and Ann were house sitting in Qualicum Beach, with their furniture in storage, when their real estate agent drove them along Quatsino Road where there was a big gap caused by a fire, and flooring for a new house under construction. Ryan got together with the builder and ended up buying the property and helping to build the house! It was finished just in time for the arrival of their furniture in April, and they've lived there ever since.

It was not long before Ryan and Ann became involved with many aspects of the activities at St. Mark's Church, where they were so warmly welcomed. Ryan was Alan Naylor's Warden for four years, then the Treasurer for three years - he still is the Envelope Secretary. He has been, and still is, involved in a myriad of church activities, including: St. Mark's Fair – Site Manager (including repainting the lines for the booths at 4 am the one year it rained the night before the Fair); the Property Committee – Chair (he has a detailed plan that tells him where everything is – sprinklers, computer cables, heat pumps, where the raccoons get in, where the bats get out, etc. etc.); Men's Group; the weekly Garden Maintenance Group; the Men's Golf Group (now defunct? – Ryan is still playing regularly); and he's the guy you go to when you need to find out how the coffee machine works.

Over the years, Ann did "most of those things the ladies do", including taking Council minutes despite rudimentary computer skills; the Garden Maintenance Group, including looking after the Garden of Remembrance; the Shawl Ministry; singing in the choir; and participating with a Church outreach group, the Eagle Park Singers.

Outside of all these church activities, both Ryan and Ann have been enthusiastic tennis and golf players (Ann wishes she had moved from tennis to golf earlier than she did) and just to cap all this off, both of them were with the Hand Bell Ringers – maybe they will be again! And – you read it here first – Ann is a virtuoso at cryptic crosswords!

What would we do without this energetic couple? Following the advice of her friend years ago, they both continue to this day to give some of their life to the Lord.


Messy EASTER!

WORSHIP: MUSIC MINISTRY LEADERSHIP





FROM THE ARCHIVES

Elizabeth recently reminded us that we will be celebrating the 100th anniversary of St. Mark's in 2026. It was Brigadier General Money who donated the site for the church.

It replaced a church on Fern Road which, although described as temporary, was used from 1913 to 1926. The land for St. Mark's was cleared by voluntary labour, and the church was evidently completed in 16 weeks! Bishop Charles Schofield opened the Church on St. Barnabas' Feast Day, June 11, 1926. General Money was a powerful influence in Qualicum Beach. Between the two World Wars he was the owner and manager of the Qualicum Beach Hotel, simply known by QB residents as 'The Hotel'. It and the Golf Course attracted many well-known tourists. His wife Maude, described as a sweet, kind woman, was active in the church, and of course there is a church window commemorating the Moneys.

In 1931 the position of rector was vacant, so Colonel Alan Playfair, owner of the Sunset Inn, (and People's Warden for 23 years!) filled in until a replacement minister was found. Well, that's one way to fill a vacancy!



FROM THE KITCHEN

Here's a multipurpose recipe from Camp Caledonia sent to us by Jennifer Roberts. It makes a huge batch and can be used for many different recipes – muffins, biscuits, pancakes or waffles (or all at the same time!!!!!!!!).

MONSTER MIX

(makes approx 34 cups)

20 cups flour3/4 cup baking powder2 tbsp cream of tartar2 lbs vegetable shortening3 tbsp salt1/2 cup sugar2 1/2 cups powdered milkMix together, rubbing until crumbly like pastry(It's helpful to freeze and grate the shortening)

Muffins

3 cups mixlegg3 tbsp sugar1 tbsp oil1 cup milk or wateradd blueberries,raspberries, cinnamon, lemon zest as desiredPour batter into buttered muffin pansBake at 400° F for 12-14 minutes

Biscuits

3 cups mix 3/4 cups water (can add grated cheese) Space out 12 - 15 scoops onto parchment paper lined cookie sheet Bake at 450° F for 10 -12 minutes

Waffles (makes about 10)

3 cups mix 1 1/2 cups water 2 eggs

Pancakes

3 cups mix 2 eggs 2 cups water

Successful Campaign Delivers Immediate Support to Children

For many years the Parish of St Mark has been sponsoring refugees from Syria. On Wednesday evening, February 15, one of our families, Sumar Al Hbayo and her husband Bader Al Faraj received news that sixty children living in camps near the Turkish border had been orphaned by the recent earthquake. Neighbours and villagers who have very little themselves are caring for the children until permanent arrangements can be made for the children. Shocked and concerned, Samar sprang into action, approaching Jennifer and Terry Roberts and the Ali Al Faraj Refugee Sponsorship committee about setting up an event to raise funds needed to help buy diapers, milk, clothing and other essentials.

Three days later, St Mark's hall facilities had been secured; our congregation was rallied and volunteers spread the word at the Saturday morning Farmers Market. Samar, her husband Bader, her brother Hesham Alhbiyou and his wife Nour Alebaid cooked for two days!! and prepared mountains of savoury Syrian dishes and treats such as hummus, baklava and date filled cookies. By Saturday, February 18, the church hall at St. Mark's was 'humming' with people coming and going, meeting our Syrian friends and their children and finding out more about the current conditions in the camps.









Donors gave generously to support the efforts and partake of the feast.

While it is very difficult to get humanitarian aid to those in need in Syria right now, the refugee committee has a long-established lifeline to get the funds to the people who need them. To date, more than \$9,000 has been realized, including the money donated at the church service the next day and other donations that came in after the event!! 100% of the money raised will go directly to support the orphans. We are indeed blest by our Syrian friends and by our generous and caring congregation and community. Thanks be to God!

While all of the money raised can't be sent in a lump sum, some has already been received. It was a wonderful day in the camp when the first instalments arrived and went to purchase food and wood for fuel. If you still wish to contribute, please speak to Terry Roberts.
